Robert Angell, 75, founded data center

CLINTON — Robert A. Angell died Thursday, Aug. 5, 2010 at Hunterdon Medical Center. He was 75.

Born in New York City, June 16, 1935, he was the son of Robert A. Angell and Elizabeth Smith. He graduated from North Hunterdon High School and Rutgers University, New Brunswick.

Angell lived in Fanwood, Rochester, N.Y. and Newport News, Va. before returning to live in Hunterdon County in 1965.

Angell in 1969, co-founded with his wife of 42 years, Shirley Wolverton Angell, a business in Bloomsbury which eventually took the name R & L DataCenters. The business originally was a computer service bureau that did data processing for various area companies and school districts before it was common for them to have their own computer systems. He retired in 2000.

Prior to that, he was a professor at Mercer County Community College, manager of data processing at Noland Company and MIS specialist at Price Waterhouse and Chase Manhattan Bank.

A member of the Lebanon Township Committee 1967-1969, Angell

was mayor in 1969. Angell served on the Hunterdon Medical Center Board of Trustees, the Hunterdon Healthcare System Board and the Hunterdon Regional Community Health Board for 25 years (1975-2000). He was honored with the Spirit Award in 2003, highlighting his dedication to HMC.

An active member of North Hunterdon Rotary Club since 1971, he served as president and then treasurer from 1988 to 2000. He was awarded the Paul Harris Fellow honor in 1992. Angell was also a trustee for the Jennie M. Haver Scholarship Committee (1979-1985) and then an honorary trustee; a director of the Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce; and on the Hunterdon County Library Commission, including chairman for a year.

Angell's wife, Shirley Wolverton, died in 1997 and his brother, John Angell in 1998.

He is survived by two children, Rob Angell III (and wife Paula) of Sherborn, Mass. and Lynn Angell (and husband David Wiant) of Clinton; his grandchildren, Robert Angell IV, Curtis Wiant, Mersina Angell, Sarah Wiant and Phoebe Wiant.

Padraig is doing well in 5th grade, is very active with Boy Scouts and is keeping up with his Tae Kwondo and guitar.

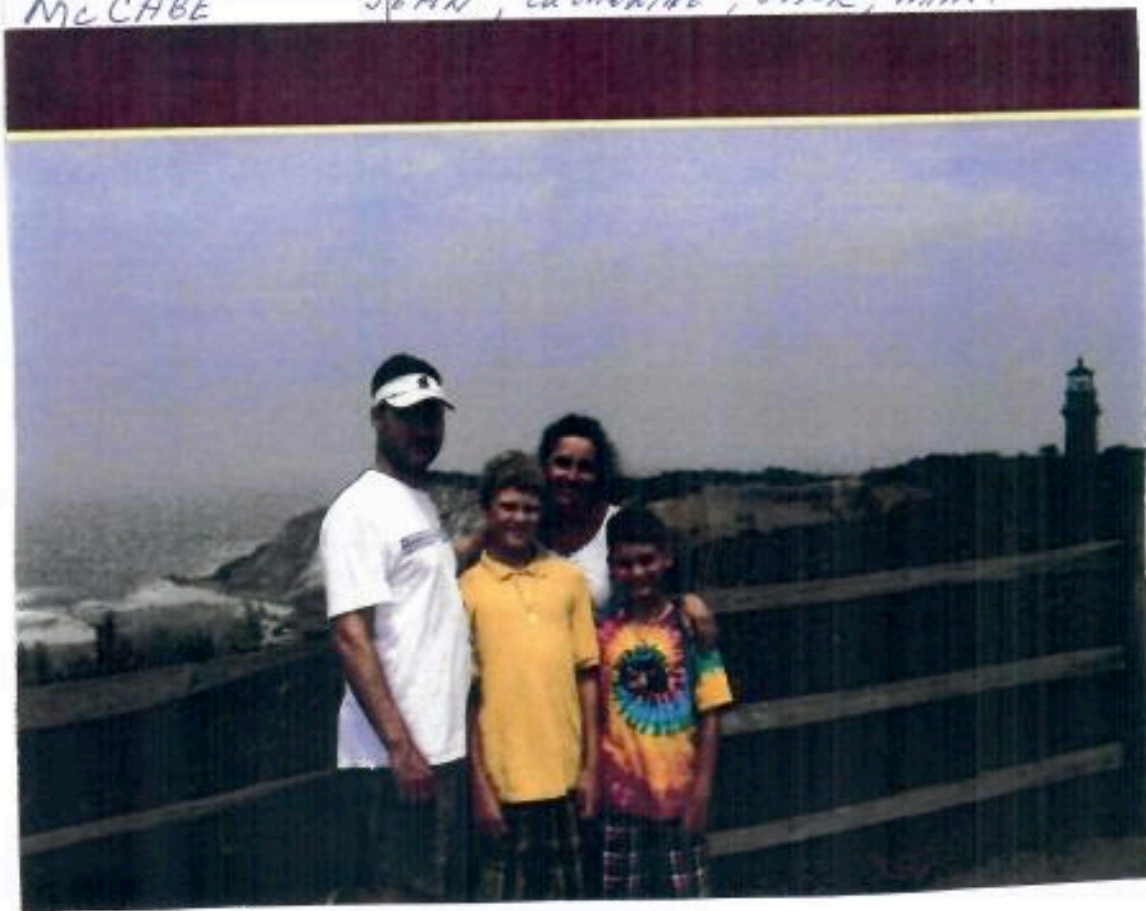

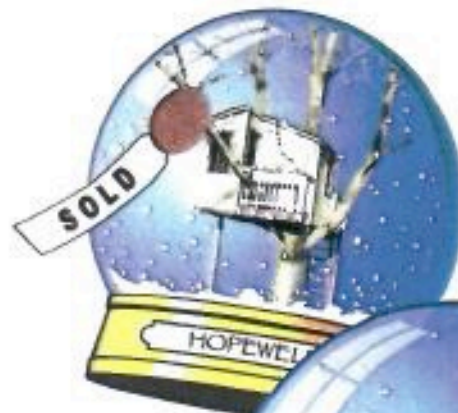

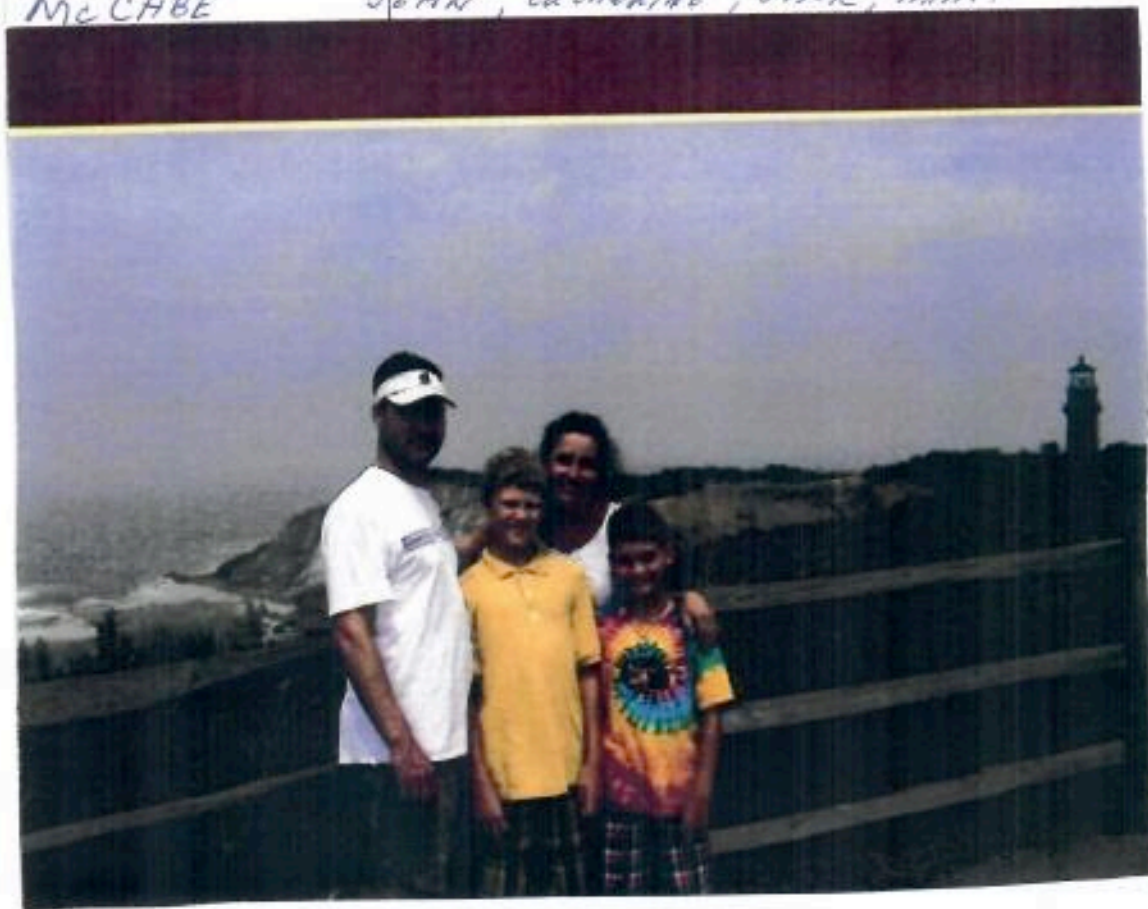
