EDITORIAL

"BE IT ENACTED...IN CONGRESS
ASSEMBLED"

Laying on my desk are three U.S. Congress bills which I consider of major importance, all having a great effect on the way we live. Within the next month, all will be a year old. And as I write this New Years Editorial, the resolution of this paper is to see that they are enacted.

One bill is HR 2600, introduced by Congressman James Harvey of Michigan. The bill concerns itself with "more effective means for protecting the public interest in national emergency disputes." In the 20 page bill, guidelines are established which would serve purpose during the settlement of a labor management dispute. The bill would protect the public from long and harmful strikes. I am convinced that if England had such a law, it would not be suffering its bitter problems--or at least the problems would be of less tension. Because HR 2600 is so important, I ask you to write Washington for a copy, read it, and make up your mind.

S. 326, introduced by Senator Harrison Williams, Jr., of New Jersey is another important act. This bill would put money into Mass Transportation lines around the country to help bring bus lines, railroads, subways, etc., out of bankruptcy and into working order. With the energy crisis, we will be relying more and more on mass transit, and it is time we made a move to improve the program.

S 747 I have already written about Senator Philip Hart's Gun Control Act on Handguns. But as yet, nothing has been done on the issue. That in itself is a crying

Next came the semi finals. Milfers got a bye to the finals and Woodglen



CONGRESS SHOULD FACE LAST YEAR'S ISSUES

Last year at about this time, the President began to have the feeling that he had been mandated by the people so highly that he could proceed through his Presidency without worry, following his own course. At that time, he began mass impoundment of funds, an operation which I criticized highly last year in this same column as totally unfair to the nation's taxpayers. The President also appointed as Director of the Office of Management and Budget, Roy Ash, a very contestable choice. But Congress had no authority to approve the questionable appointment. So, on both issues, Congress decided to take action. In the Senate, Sen. Sam J. Ervin, Jr. introduced an Impoundment Control Bill, which was cosponsored by more than $\frac{1}{2}$ of the United States Senate. Also introduced was a bill requiring that all appointees of the Office of Management and Budget be approved by the Senate. Both bills passed the House and Senate, both were vetoed by the President, and both vetoes were SUSTAINED by the Congress. But once again, I rise in support of the bills. As we have seen, the President recently Impeounded 3 Billion dollars in appropriated funds from a water treatment act; thus the need for the Impoundment Control bill. And with Government men elected, non confirmed officials revealing wrong doing every day, it is important that the powerful Management and Budget Office come under Senate scrutiny. These issues should be of major concern to the American public. So once again, I call on you to contact your Congressional representatives and urge action on these

Milford Takes It

Woodglen's defense cracked in the last moments of the Woodglen Invitational Touch Football Tournament of 1973 as the Milford Athletic Association under Coach Gino Van Benthysen took the trophy. The Tournament was originally played December 16 but was postponed (the first is) until Super Bowl Sunday (see January '74 Issue). When the 4th Quarter, the decider, came on, and when the WAA failed to advance, Milford was in charge again. With 2 minutes to go, quarterback Bachman went on Defense and intercepted a Rich pass. Returning to offense, and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ minutes to go, Bachman found Al Castner and drilled him a pass, Castner coming up with an important first down. Then came a Castner catch 10 yards from the endzone as the clock ran out. But according to WAA rules, the Milford team had the right to finish its series of plays. So on the next play, with time expired, Al Castner was again ready, and he caught the touchdown pass as Milford won, 14-7.

THE 1975 NIXON BUDGET

To say the least, I am shocked at the new budget introduced in February by the President. In two words, I can announce my opinion of it--too high." 304 billion dollars with an 11 billion dollar deficit is plainly too much. I look at it this way: if we are to move out of a period of inflation, we must adopt a balanced budget, we need sensible Federal spending, and we have to put our dollars toward useful projects.

In 1972, the President asked for a \$50 billion dollar spending ceiling. Later, it was asked by the President to be extended to 275 billion. But the President has now outdone himself again with this wild 304 billion dollar budget. I think that Congress should take steps to reduce the payments. Here are my suggestions: Cut the Defense budget so that US Servicemen in Europe are paid for by the NATO Allies they protect. If this does not arise the men should be withdrawn to the United States. Foreign Aid shall be eliminated with the small exception of emergency relief as determined needed by the Secretary of State with the advise and consent of Congress. All military equipment GIVEAWAY practices should be dropped so that the United States pays only for its defense, and not the benefactor and financial wizard of world policeman. I however, suggest that allies have the right to buy at NON subsidized prices, military machinery. I think that spending in the ranks of the State Department's Ambassadorial Palaces can be reduced. You will remember the article I wrote about Stewart Alsop's book "The Center," chapter; "The Sad State of State." Yes, right now,


COLLECTIONS


"I leave with regrets, and hope that with the ending of this publication, I can leave installed in the memories of my readers that for more than 5 years, they were able to look to us as the source of information."

A TAX CUT ?

Fulbright, an advocate of lowering Foreign Aid spending will not return to the next session.) And what about the terrible bureaucracy in the State Department that Stewart Alsop wrote of in his book, The Center. But even if we were to get these things taken care of, a tax cut would totally reduce the effectiveness of taking away the wasteful programs. I say work for a balanced budget; close tax loopholes, and work for reform in the tax structure. But before we got it, don't take away the revenues.
